Multi-agency illegal vape and tobacco seizure





Neighbourhood policing officers joined Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Trading Standards and HMRC in a multi-agency crack down on the sale of illegal tobacco and vapes on 24 June.

In Ely, Soham, and Littleport, they seized:

- 32,040 cigarettes
- 8.8kg of hand rolling tobacco
- 3,171 illegal vapes.

Products seized include vapes with oversized tanks and incorrect labelling, as well as vapes not notified to the Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency, meaning they are not legal in the UK. Also seized were tobacco products without the correct warnings and labelling in English.

Data-rich dashboard tackles violent crime

A new dashboard has been created for partners across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough to assist in tackling serious violence.

The interactive dashboard, produced by the policy and insight team at Cambridgeshire County Council, was created following the publication of the strategic needs assessment in support of the serious violence duty.

It presents data on police recorded crime, those who are suspected or known to have committed a violent crime, and risk factors known locally.

The datasets, provided across a range of organisations, draws together the partnership approach to tackling serious violence. This evidence base will assist partners, communities, policy makers, and researchers.

For the strategic needs assessment and this dashboard, serious violence is defined as: the intentional use of physical force (with or without a weapon) or power, threatened or actual, against oneself, another person, or against a group, or community, that either results in, or has a high likelihood of, resulting in injury, death, psychological harm, adverse childhood/early life experiences and adversity.

Students' artwork is 'out of this world'





Art students from Ely Community College have showcased their vision and style with a vibrant space-themed street art installation.

The gateway underpass at the Ely Leisure Village has been adorned with colour and flair by students in Years 9 and 10 from the college.

Street artist Kilo, lead artist at Splash & Dash Creations Ltd, worked with the students to teach street art skills and facilitate the development of the mural, with students painting their designs directly on the underpass wing near Costa coffee.

The installation was phase two of a successful and exciting partnership project with young people. The collaborative project has involved key partners City of Ely Council, Ely Community College, East Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridgeshire County Council.

Lis Every, Chair of the East Cambs Community Safety Partnership said: "Working with the students in the design and installation of the artwork has been inspirational and seeing them engaging fully in the project has been so rewarding.

"Our thanks go to the City of Ely Council for their continued support and funding towards the project."

Cllr Mike Banyard, The Mayor of Ely, added: "Engaging with young people and seeing their collaborative approach to claiming their local area as a place to be both inspired by and proud of has been a positive experience for everyone involved.

Phase one last year saw artwork installed inside the underpass and covering the wing nearest the green open space and walkways which lead to the leisure village. This year the

students stepped up once again, adding their designs directly on the wing of the underpass.

Knife crime discussed at Court Days



The CSP has delivered another successful round of Court Experience Days for school year 2024-2025.

These give young people the opportunity to learn more about the workings of a court, including various job opportunities available, and what to do if they come across a crime. Typically, they take place at the former Magistrate's Court in Ely.

It includes a

- Walk through of a trial (role play)
- Considering the different roles around court
- · Analysing a criminal statute
- Seeing how judges' decisions make a difference
- Making decisions in court
- What is a fair trial?
- An introduction to sentencing

As part of the day children are also briefed on knife crime and County Lines.

Hate Crime on the rise in East Cambridgeshire

The number of hate crime offences in East Cambridgeshire has increased by a third over the last year.

A hate crime is defined as 'any criminal offence which is perceived, by the victim or any other person, to be motivated by hostility or prejudice towards someone based on a personal characteristic'.


The police can apply a hate crime related marker to any offence where it appears to be motivated by at least one of the 5 monitored hate crime characteristics: race or ethnicity, religion or beliefs, disability, sexual orientation, and transgender identity.

As shown in the graph below, after annual decreases in hate crime offences in East Cambridgeshire between 2021 and 2023, last year saw an increase of 34% compared to 2023.

However, the count for 2024 remained 21% lower than 2021. Given the high level of under-reporting of hate crime caution should be taken when interpreting these figures. This is an area where lived experience of residents would add value to the CSP's understanding of the impact locally.

The latest release of national data shows that levels of hate crime fell by 5% in 2023/24. This is the second consecutive reduction since records were first collected in 2013.

The release of the figures coincides with Hate Crime Awareness Week, which this year runs from 11 to 18 October.

Think Bike Safety

So far this year, 10 lives have been tragically lost in collisions involving motorbikes across Cambridgeshire. That's 10 lives too many, and it's a reminder that every road user must ride or drive with care and responsibility.

Advice for riders is to take every precaution:

- All the gear, all the time: use a helmet with a high SHARP rating, impact-certified
 jacket, gloves, trousers, and boots. Bright and reflective gear boosts visibility, all
 the time
- Maintenance matters: check tyres, brakes, lights, mirrors, chain and fluid levels before every ride
- Ride defensively using the IPSGA approach: consider Information Position –
 Speed Gear Acceleration to navigate hazards safely
- **Stay visible:** use lights at all times and position yourself where drivers can see you especially at junctions or where obstructions exist
- Ride to arrive: adjust speed to road, traffic, and weather conditions
- Consider advanced training: Cambridgeshire Constabulary BikeSafe

Drivers and other road users should Think Biker!

- Take longer to look: Look, look and look again, especially at junctions, before you pull out, change lanes or open a door
- **Time and space:** Give other road users space when overtaking, don't tailgate, and be patient when filtering bikes pass through traffic
- **Expect bikes everywhere:** Riders may pass on either side at low speeds or in traffic remain vigilant
- Be extra careful on rural roads and bends: Uneven surfaces like gravel, potholes or manholes can quickly send a bike rider off course

Motorcyclists make up just 2% of road users nationally but account for around 20% of those killed or seriously injured.

We all share responsibility. Every journey, long or short, is an opportunity to ride or drive safely, so everyone arrives home.
